


The next **NASFA Meeting** is Saturday **21 November 2009** at the **regular time** (6P) and the **new regular location**. Meetings are at the Renasant Bank's Community Room, 4245 Balmoral Drive in south Huntsville. Exit the Parkway at Airport Road; head east one short block to Balmoral Drive; turn left (north) for less than a block. The bank is on the right, just past Logan's Roadhouse restaurant. Enter at the front door of the bank; turn right to the end of a short hallway.

HUGO SERIES TO START

It has been announced that Prime Books <www.prime-books.com> has entered into a licensing agreement to publish the first volume of a projected Hugo Award Showcase series. This first volume will be edited by Mary Robinette Kowal and is expected to feature Hugo-award-winning stories from 2009. Those winners will be announced at the 2010 Worldcon in Australia.

Candidates for the coming Going Under (or Get Up and Over) Fan Fund have been announced as James Shields and Douglas Spencer. An online ballot is expected to be available by the time this *Shuttle* arrives in our reader's hands. This year the race is from north (Europe) to south (Australasia) and the winner will attend Aussiecon 4, the 2010 Worldcon.

CON DISASTER GOES TO COURT

Shane Senter, organizer of the ill-fated (and over-promised) JumpCon series of conventions is to appear in court 23 November to enter an arranged guilty plea for two violations of New Hampshire's Consumer Protection Act and two theft charges. Reports are that the state will recommend a suspended sentence, 5 years probation, and an agreement to pay restitution to victims.

None of the JumpCon events ever happened and Senter ended up owing massive debts to hotels, other suppliers, invited guests, and prepaid convention attendees. He has already filed Chapter 7 bankruptcy, but that would apparently not discharge his repayment obligations under the criminal plea deal.

Many longtime sf convention runners had expressed deep skepticism when JumpCon's ambitious plans—and sketchy business model—were announced for a series of cons across the US starting in July 2008. Nonetheless, many fairly-high profile actors signed up as guests and apparently quite a few tickets were purchased at various price levels up to several hundred dollars.

ANOTHER NEW AWARD

Another new award, the Science Fiction and Fantasy Translation Award <www.sfftawards.org>, was announced during World Fantasy Con. The first set of awards will be for works published in calendar year 2010 and will be presented at the Eaton Conference in the spring of 2011.

The SFFTs will be for “works of speculative fiction translated *into* English from other languages.” The organizers believe that this will be the first continuing awards for such works, though many awards exist for works translated from English to other languages. The awards will be in two categories—long form (40,000 words and above) and short form.

BACK TO THE GRAVEYARD

Neil Gaiman's *The Graveyard Book* has scored yet another award from outside the “mainstream” sf awards. The Elizabeth Burr/Worzalla Award <www.wla.lib.wi.us/yss/BookAward/burrworzallahome.htm> is presented by the Wisconsin Library Association for distinguished achievement in children's literature.

WSFA SMALL PRESS AWARD

The Washington Science Fiction Association has announced the winner of their 2009 WSFA Small Press Award for Short Fiction <wsfasmallpressaward.org>. Eligibility requirements include a length of 17,500 words or less and first English in the previous calendar year. The winner is **Greg Siewert** for “**The Absence of Stars: Part 1**,” published in *Orson Scott Card's Intergalactic Medicine Show* (Edmund R. Schubert, ed., Hatrack Publishing).

A Stroll In The Dark...

No Need for a Ring—Chapter 28

[Editor's Note: This chapter begins the third part of the NNFAR trilogy—*The Thing Goes South*—and is thus numbered as Chapter 1 in some places. The *Shuttle* is serializing the entire tale and chooses to use the alternate sequential chapter numbering system.]

The dragon waits alone in the deeper darkness of the underground... increasing the glow of her body as her eyes adjust to the dimness. She turns and begins climbing the stairway. One hundred steps later, she reaches the top and pauses at the landing. She coughs and expels the smaller orb and considers it. The light of the rising moon allows her to watch the action outside the doors she just closed behind her. The Brown Wizard and the elf are apparently talking, though the Palantír does not transmit sound. The wizard is seen to pause; and then he places his hands close in front of his mouth. After a moment, the elf

follows suit. Another elf, Rúmil, approaches and embraces his brother. The three seem to be sharing a lot of recent news. Rúmil leads the others to the tethered steeds. They all rearrange the packs and mount. Back they all ride at speed northward in the direction of Rivendell.

After re-swallowing the stone, the dragon sets off at an easy pace down the passageway that Gandalf trod a little over a century before. The wizard's memory imprint helps guide the new intruder... who watches and sniffs and listens continually. This area of the realm was most likely uninhabited, but still there was no need to go carelessly.

Eventually, the forking passages are reached. The dragon pauses and turns aside into the guard room and considers the well. There is no sound therefrom, nor any careless Took at hand to drop in a pebble. The dragon regurgitates the stone and gazes within... back... back and back. Centuries drop away until lights are seen. The Dwarves are active in this area at this era. PED observes their goings and works; especially in and through the three main passageways. She follows working parties back and forth for some time, planning some of her next moves.

Giving up the threads of the ancient past for now, she returns to the present and pauses, thirsty. She considers the well. It is too small for her present size, and there was no point expending energy to become smaller. She therefore bends over the gap and lets fall a single drop of liquid from her mouth. After several seconds there is a tiny plink below, but no other sound.

“Come up” she speaks; with Power.

There is now an answering gurgle from below. After several minutes the water level reaches the top and begins to run over and out away.

She takes a long drink. Then, rubbing her head against the wall, she merges somewhat with the essence of this mountain: Cloudyhead. In a manner more akin to negotiation than command, the mountain accepts some of her power and seals off all outer openings. Nothing can enter or leave without her desire.

Taking up the stone once more, she moves out and follows the left-hand passageway. Down and down toward the coal mines in the Deeps under Cloudyhead (Fanuidhol the Grey). Keeping her mouth and nostrils sealed as before, she pauses only to summon up more waters from the deep places. Clearing areas of fallen stone, she makes sure that as many passages as possible will be available to permit entry of flowing waters into the coal seams and the concurrent exit of the “bad airs” toward the upper world. There they will become very useful to her.

There were no fossil imprints in the coal here, either.

The waters are already pooling in the coal beds when she returns back to the guard chamber and the three branching passages. Water flows out of the chamber from the deep well there, running down toward the coal mines. Turning aside, she follows the narrow, middle passage. This one twists and turns among various different kinds of rocks. Here and there a tiny crystalline chip reflects back some of her glow. Many side passages are too narrow for her to navigate naturally. All bear signs of transport of various gem-bearing ores, but no big, or even tiny, gemstones are left sticking out of the walls of the wider tunnels.

Returning to the “crossroads,” PED now takes the right path. The waters behind her are ankle-deep and rising, though still mainly running down to the left. Plodding steadily along, PED eventually reaches the wider chambers traversed by the Nine Walkers. Dim light slants down from the high windows. The dragon retreats back into the tunnel and settles down to rest a while. Her eyes never completely close. There are faint scents of goblin presence, somewhere ahead.

Day in the upper world gives way to night. A few hours later, PED hears her *name* spoken not terribly far away; ahead. It seems the goblin messengers in the Misty Mountains have finally made it south and around the Redhorn Gate, as the dangerous pass is called, to the East Gate of Moria. Rested, she spends some time communing with this mountain, Silvertine, and sealing it like Cloudyhead before.

Now, having observed the movements of the long-ago Dwarves when this place was plentifully populated, before the release of the Balrog, the dragon makes her way through side passageways until she reaches the great chasm and its broken bridge. Without even a pause, she goes over the edge and heads straight down!

Finally reaching the deep lake, she plunges in and starts swimming around; concentrating on that little ring on her claw. Accidents do happen, and treasures can slip. The Dwarves seem to have been extremely careful of their Mithril, only a few scattered chunks of ore are located here. They are immediately swallowed by the dragon to begin processing. There are plenty of other things that her passage over the muddy bottom reveal. Being useless to her, she leaves them in place. All, that is, except for two halves of a broken wooden staff. A staff that retains some very faint trace of magic. Now, the only tugs from the ring are a general attraction toward the Northeast. That would be from the Mithril lodes under Redhorn.

Finished with the deep lake, PED invokes the *command* once more, and the waters start rising from beneath, and from streams and freshets that start running down the walls. PED rests now on the bosom of the rising waters. They will return her to the upper levels in good time. Gluing the staff fragments to her horns, she begins growing a new set of scales. Rolling onto her back; she begins raising and lowering her wings against the combined resistance of water and gravity. A period of sustained exercise is indicated, to stretch and strengthen the flight muscles in their new, larger configuration. The day will come when she returns to the skies! Then she must learn the patterns necessary for flight with her new body. Meanwhile, the rising waters lift her ever upward through the darkness of Moria.

August... I keep hearing about the *SFC Handbook*, and I think I might like to get a copy. I think I'll wait for the new edition to come out, but I would like to read up, and add it to my fannish reference shelf.

Eric Flint will be our GoH at Ad Astra 2010 this coming April, just in time for *Baen's Universe* to cease e-publication. I hope Eric will bring with him the best memories of this website, and of Jim Baen himself. World Fantasy will be in San Jose soon... if Neil Gaiman wins this one, too, he must wonder if he has the Midas touch, that everything he types up turns to award gold. Many were unhappy with the Best Fanzine Hugo win of John Klima's *Electric Velocipede*, but if he has been nominated for the WFC's Special Award (non-Professional), perhaps the WFC nominators know something the Worldcon nominators don't.

Ah, Montréal was such fun. I could repeat what I've written for other zines, but to summarize... we gave out a Hugo, I came within one nomination of being on the ballot, we attended the Aurora banquet as a nominee (didn't win, but hey), and the fanzine lounge was a great place to be. We partied like mad, and had ourselves a time. We are going to try to go to Reno for the 2011 Worldcon, but how much we can save for it will determine a lot. I am hopeful that bids will rise up for 2015 and 2016, but I must wonder if those days of three or four bids for a particular year are over.

To the best of my knowledge the Palais de Congres was charging megabucks for WiFi access, and at the last minute, dropped all charges. Many of us wish we'd known they were going to do this. I don't know about other venues, like the Delta... there were pre-con discussions about access, and everything was carefully decided and re-checked, given that many on the committee could use that access, too. The Delta may not have been ready for the surging herds of party-frenzied fans. As always, fans criticize the convention for dealers when if the dealers had looked into it, the convention had made it as painless as possible to import their goods. They could have reduced their hassle, and increased the selection.

I had heard about Ben Indick being inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame, and it is a shame that he has recently passed away. At least he received this award before passing, and got to enjoy it as award, if only for a short time.

It's been a long time since I've done any masquerade work, but I can happily say that I know about half of the prize-winners at the masquerade. I did not go to the masquerade, but I heard much about it, especially from our local costumers, who we are starting to meet with again after our long absence.

September... More Worldcon. Fine with me, Anticipation was one of my favourite Worldcons to date. We now have supporting memberships to Aussiecon 4, so at least we can vote and participate that way.

Anticipation... we stayed at the Embassy Suites Hotel right beside the Palais de Congres, so we were always a short walk away from the con. I am sure the staff at the Delta doubted your familial heritage as you gave them your best fake French accents, but as Yvonne is fluent in French, her first language, I got to bring my translator along. Con suite was good, but because we were busy, and the Delta was a walk away, we only got into it once. The parties were amazing, especially the British/Irish party, and man, that convention centre was a walk.

[The contents of the current *SFC Handbook* are available online at <www.smithuel.net/sfchb>, with minor updates for some bits of the info ongoing (e.g., basic info about sitting and past DeepSouthCons). Nonetheless, if one wants long-term access to the info I'd recommend a physical copy of the *Handbook*—at least if you have a good filing system where you can lay your hands on specific printed material. I don't know that this version will remain online indefinitely after the new *Handbook* is finished. OTOH, in my estimation that update will take a couple more years to come to fruition. I do think something like a wiki would be a better way than a printed book to keep the actual material available and at least semi-up-to-date. (One can restrict who edits a wiki, but even if everyone can muck around in it one of the good things about wikis is that they can be set up to archive an essentially infinite number of past versions. Yes, finding info in those past versions is too hard, but at least a version doesn't get overwritten for all time.) -ED]
