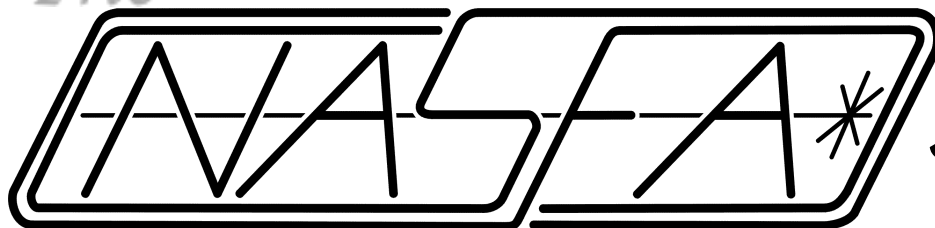

The next **NASFA Meeting** will be Saturday **21 April 2012** at the **regular time** (6P) and the **regular location**. 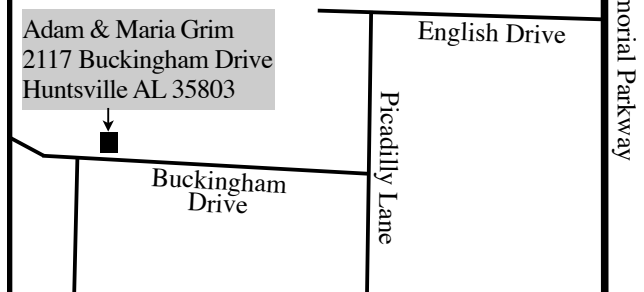
CHANGING SHUTTLE DEADLINES

TWO FANNISH COLLECTIONS FIND NEW HOMES

The University of Iowa Libraries <www.lib.uiowa.edu> has acquired the late Rusty Hevelin's collection of pulps, fanzines, and books. The press release notes "The collection encompasses nearly one hundred years of material, documenting in great detail the development of science fiction, popular culture, and participatory fan culture in the United States during the twentieth century." Existing related UofI holdings include the Horvat Collection of Science Fiction Fanzines, the Ming Wathne Fanzine Archive Collection, and material from the Fan Culture Preservation Project.

In March of this year it was revealed that fan photographer Jay Kay Klein was donating his photo collection to the Eaton Collection <eaton.ucr.edu> (University of California, Riverside) with initial shipments having already arrived. The Eaton Collection is already a major holder of fanzines and fannish ephemera as well as professional genre works. More recently, and more sadly, Klein was reportedly admitted to a hospice with terminal esophageal cancer.

E-BOOK LAWSUIT

Earlier this year the Department of Justice started making noises about filing a lawsuit alleging antitrust violations by Apple (iBooks) and several major publishers (Hachette, HarperCollins, Macmillan, Simon & Schuster, and Penguin/Pearson) over e-book pricing. The practice in question is the so-called Agency Model wherein the publishers each set their prices and a seller (in this case Apple) takes a percentage cut.

As of about 6 April 2012, Hachette, HarperCollins, and Simon & Schuster had reportedly expressed interest in a settlement, with the other parties taking a harder line. On 11 April the other shoe dropped and the lawsuit was filed. News reports say that sixteen states are joining the suit on DoJ's side of the aisle. Reports also indicate that the three publishers interested in settling may have already done so.

In possibly related news, Amazon (which by some accounts sells up to 60% of all ebooks) has announced a plan to reduce US prices on some e-titles from \$14.99 to \$9.99.

COMICS NEWS

Three semi-unrelated bits of news from the comics world caught the *Shuttle's* virtual eye this month.

First, Stan Lee is writing (or, rather, producing) himself into his latest comic book. The "high concept" statement for *Stan Lee's Mighty 7* (the first of which is in stores now) might be "Reality TV Meets Superhero Comics." Lee is the Reality part.

Second, Marvel has announced that beginning June 2012 all Marvel superhero comics priced at \$3.99 will include a code for a free digital copy of the same issue—on either iOS (Apple) or Android. This appears to be an expansion of an existing trial wherein selected Marvel lines included the digital download.

Third, and again over at Marvel, look for an augmented reality app (again for iOS and Android devices). The app is launching with *Avengers vs. X-Men #1* this month and will feature content such as creator commentary videos, extra art, and interactive 3D models, when used in conjunction with a compatible comic.

SCIENCE FICTION MUSEUM NO

LONGER COVERS SCIENCE FICTION?

The Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame—part of the EMP Museum in Seattle WA—no longer really covers science fiction (or at least not much of it).

Over the last few years, much of their broad coverage of the history of the field has apparently been put in mothballs. Currently a large part (if not all) of their space is devoted to an *Avatar* exhibit and "Can't Look Away: The Lure of Horror Film." The Science Fiction Hall of Fame Gallery is currently off exhibit also, but is under renovation and is scheduled to

reopen summer of this year. An exhibit called "Icons of Science Fiction" that sounds like it will restore some of their previous display ("one-of-a-kind artifacts from literature, film, television, and art") is scheduled to open at the same time.

CHABON JOINS AMERICAN ACADEMY OF ARTS AND LETTERS

Michael Chabon has been named to the American Academy of Arts and Letters. Membership in the prestigious group is capped at 250, so new members are elected only when a post is vacated, typically by death. The formal induction ceremony will be in May. Chabon is quoted as saying "I knew that when the gray came in it was only a matter of time before my augustness would be recognized."

WOULD YOU GO TO TREK VEGAS?

A possibly self-serving post <tinyurl.com/TrekVegas> by The Goddard Group (an "independent entertainment design company" headed by Gary Goddard) has grabbed some notice in the blogosphere.

The post tells of plans to build a full-scale replica of Star Trek's *Enterprise* as part of the 1992 revitalization of downtown Las Vegas. The ship was to be depicted as if in dry dock (due to supports necessary to hold up parts that would otherwise be unsafely cantilevered). It would have included tours and shows in selected interior spaces kitted out like the fictional ship.

Why wasn't it built? Supposedly it was greenlighted by both Las Vegas officials and functionaries at Paramount (up to and including the prez). However, when the final pitch was made to Paramount's then CEO, Stanley Jaffe, the idea was nixed. Goddard quotes Jaffe as saying "In the movie business, when we produce a big movie and it's a flop—we take some bad press for a few weeks or a few months, but then it goes away. The next movie comes out and everyone forgets. But *this*—this is different. If this doesn't work—if this is not a success—it's there, forever..."

So what was built instead? According to Goddard The Fremont Experience <www.vegasexperience.com> (with its signature rooftop video canopy) had been runner up in the race to select a promotional idea and was itself promoted to winner once the *Enterprise* deal went south.

SF IS OUT DOWN UNDER

The Australian Broadcasting Corporation's 6-part series *Outland* <www.abc.net.au/tv/outland> is officially described as "A comedy about a gay science fiction fan club and the lives, loves and never-ending dramas of its five members." Reportedly, the sfnal content is slight, but it still sounds like something that might be a fun watch for fans of all sexual orientations. Bits are available at YouTube, but your editor found no obvious way to viddy the series in the States.

Hugo/Campbell Nominations

Nominations for the 2012 Hugo Awards and 2012 Campbell Award were announced during a ceremony held Saturday 7 April 2012—jointly at five conventions (Norwescon 35, Seatac (Seattle-area) WA; Leprecon 38, Tempe AZ; Minicon 47, Bloomington MN; Marcon 47, Columbus OH; and Olympus 2012 (Eastercon), London UK). Each venue hosted a live video streamed on the internet (via Ustream).

Final balloting will run Monday 9 April 2012 through Tuesday 31 July 2012, 11:59 p.m. PDT (Wednesday 1 August 2012 1:59 a.m. CDT). Only member of this year's worldcon, Chicon 7 <www.chicon.org>, can vote in this final round. Votes

can be submitted on the Chicon website or by postal mail. A printed ballot will be in Chicon's next Progress Report (PR4), but is already available (as a PDF) for download. Those voting online will need their membership number as well as a PIN, which will be distributed by e-mail where possible. PINs will also be on the PR4 mailing label for members receiving printed publications.

Winners will be announced and the awards presented at Chicon 7, to be held 30 August–3 September 2012 at the Hyatt Regency Chicago in Chicago IL. There were a total of 1,101 valid ballots in the first (nominating) round. This bests the previous high-water mark of 1,006 nominating ballots received by Renovation last year. TIPTREE AWARD ANNOUNCED

The winner of the 2011 **James Tiptree, Jr. Award** <www.tiptree.org>(for “science fiction or fantasy that expands or explores our understanding of gender”) has been announced. The award went to Andrea Hairston’s *Redwood and Wildfire* (Aqueduct). Hairston will receive \$1,000, original artwork created to honor the winning work, and chocolate.

Jurors (Lynne Thomas (chair), Karen Meisner, James Nicoll, Tansy Rayner Roberts, and Nisi Shawl) also selected an Honor List of runners-up. These included *Beauty Queens*, Libba Bray (Scholastic); “The Nones of Quintilus,” L. Timmel Duchamp (*Never at Home*, Aqueduct Press); *God’s War*, Kameron Hurley (Night Shade); *The Universe of Things*, Gwyneth Jones (Aqueduct); “The Other Graces,” Alice Sola Kim (*Asimov’s* July 2010); “Seven Sexy Cowboy Robots,” Sandra McDonald (*Strange Horizons* 10/5/2010); “After the Apocalypse,” Maureen F. McHugh (*After the Apocalypse*, Small Beer Press); *The Freedom Maze*, Delia Sherman (Big Mouth House); and *The Courier’s New Bicycle*, Kim Westwood (HarperVoyager Australia).

GoT PEABODY

The HBO adaptation of George R.R. Martin’s *Game of Thrones* has won a **Peabody Award** <peabody.uga.edu/71stwinners.php>. The Peabodys are for “distinguished and meritorious public service by radio and television stations, networks, producing organizations and individuals.” The official announcement read:

“Adapted from dark-age fantasy books by George R.R. Martin, the series immerses viewers in a multilayered, distinctly imagined world of mysticism and earthiness, fidelity and deceit, wonder and mayhem.”

CBC BOOKIE AWARDS

CBC Books (part of the Canadian Broadcasting Company) has announced the winners of the 2nd annual CBC Bookies—promoted as the “Canadian People’s Choice Awards.” Voting was via their website.

In the **Science Fiction, Fantasy, or Speculative Fiction** category, the winner was Caitlin Sweet’s *The Pattern Scars*, with a bit over 50% of the vote. In the **Young Adult** category fantasy/horror novel *The Gathering*, Kelley Armstrong, won with a bit less than a third of the vote.

SFWA AWARDS ANNOUNCED

The Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America <www.

sfgwa.org> has announced the winner of two awards.

The **Solstice Award** is for “persons, living or dead, who have consistently had a positive, transformative influence on the genre of science fiction and fantasy.” Further, “[t]he award is given at the discretion of the president, with the majority approval of the SFWA Board of Directors.” Two winners have been announced for 2012, **Octavia Butler** and **John Clute**.

The **Service To SFWA Award** is for, well, service to SFWA. **Clarence Howard “Bud” Webster** will be so honored, in large part for his work with the Estate Project. That project “is designed to track and distribute information pertaining to deceased members of the community. Bud has worked extensively with agents, executors and heirs to track this valuable information. Due to his patience and perseverance, this information is now available to the industry at large.”

Both awards will be presented during the 47th Annual Nebula Awards Weekend, to be held 17–20 May 2012 at the Hyatt Regency Crystal City in Arlington VA.

[You are quite correct, Sheryl, that *not* renaming an award but creating a new, similar one in honor of some—to use your word—worthy could be a problem. I wouldn't couch it so much in terms of crowding the field... more like dilution of meaning. By the time the dozenth award is created "to honor service to the field of (to be non sfnal) collecting Hummel figurines depicting men wearing inauthentic Civil War reproduction uniforms"—well, people might stop paying attention to just how prestigious the honor is. Reductio ad absurdum? Yes—and probably on the slippery slope toward a fallacious *slippery slope* argument; still... One possible compromise would be to hyphenate—so the Smythe Award becomes the Smythe-Phellows Award, honoring the late Ms Phellows, a past winner of the Smythe Award and generally recognized as the preeminent figure in collecting Hummel figurines depicting blah, blah, blah. Yeah, one would have to be firm to see that *that* doesn't get out of hand, too. As for lining out rather than simply not printing the Hypericon listing, that was a conscious choice. There are *Shuttle* readers who usually go to Hypericon and we wanted to serve them by bringing to their attention both that the con would not happen this year and that it is planned to resume in 2013. On consideration, I've decided not to keep the notice in the calendar; once is enough. Had we previously published that they *were* on track for 2012 I suspect we'd have continued the lined-out listing. RE the beanstalk, the choice of what safety margin to design to is interesting. A while back at my job I had to look up some figures on required safety factors for shipboard lifting equipment. The required factor varies depending on the type of rope (metal wire versus natural fiber versus synthetic fiber, for instance) and on the application, but it can easily be as high as 7. (That is, the *minimum* breaking strength of the rope must be at least 7 times the *maximum* load ever to be applied to it.) Many engineers would argue that's way too conservative and for most applications they would be right, but some applications are in unpredictable environments (like at sea or stretched over miles of atmosphere) and some applications are not yet well understood (like beanstalks), so I hope a conservative design margin would be adopted. -ED]



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
