Con†Stellation 2014 Canceled



News & Info

HUGO PROCESS IN THE NEWS

The Hugos have been in the news—not all of it positive—for aspects of the process.

For one thing, a record number of ballots were received in the nominating round. The 1923 ballots received represent a bump of over 40% from the previous record, set last year. The vast majority (1889) of them were cast online while only a scant handful (34) were on paper. Part of this record came from the change in 2012 to allow nominating by members of the

next year's Worldcon, not just the current and immediate past ones. Too, Loncon 3 has an unusually large membership base; it's likely to be the largest Worldcon in recent years and has an outside chance of setting the all-time record. (There were 6095 members of all stripes as of 21 March 2014.)

And then there are the semi-controversies about campaigning/bloc voting. Even (sort of) newspaper *USA Today* chimed in <tinyurl.com/USATHuCo> on the campaign by Larry Correia, *et al.*, to get some "right-leaning" authors on the Hugo ballot. (Whether they would have made it on the ballot or not without Correia's blog—though he certainly claims credit <tinyurl.com/CoBlogCredit>—it's true that several things he promoted made the ballot... including one of his own novels.) Aaaand the interwebs take much notice.

Other parts of the interwebs are exercised by the nomination of the entire Wheel of Time series in the novel category. The WSFS Constitution does have an accommodation to make a serial work eligible in the year the last part is published (*n.b.*: serial is not synonymous with series). Publisher Tor championed the concept <tinyurl.com/TORBlogWoTSerial> that the series was in fact a single multi-decade, multi-author, serial. Some of the questions raised by this nomination are: (1) what makes a series of books one serial work versus multiple discrete (albeit connected) works, (2) does the WoT fit that definition of a single serial work, and (3) when is one actually sure there will be no more works in a given serial?

HUGO PACKET NOT TO INCLUDE ALL NOVELS

In recent years Worldcons have negotiated with publishers of Hugo-nominated works to provide electronic copies of many works to potential Hugo voters. (That is, to members of the current Worldcon.) Note that this is a purely voluntary thing; the Worldcon has no obligation to put the packet together and the publishers have no obligation to cooperate.

This year one publisher is in fact not cooperating. Orbit, publisher of *Parasite* (Mira Grant), *Ancillary Justice* (Ann Leckie), and *Neptune's Brood* (Charles Stross) has decided that for policy reasons they will not furnish the full novels. Orbit does promise to provide "substantial extracts" of each novel for the packet.

Warbound, Book III of the Grimnoir Chronicles (Larry Correia, Baen Books) and the entire Wheel of Time Series (Robert Jordan and Brandon Sanderson, Tor Books) are expected to be part of the packet.

HUGO/RETRO HUGO NOM CEREMONY ONLINE

The Hugo and Retro Hugo nomination announcement was streamed live from the UK to the web and conventions in the United States on Saturday 19 April 2014. The presentation is available for online viewing at <www.ustream.tv/hugo-awards>. Sponsors helping out Loncon 3 <www.loncon3.org> with the ceremony included Satellite 4, the British National Science Fiction Convention (Eastercon)—where the announcement ceremony took place—plus Norwescon 37 and Minicon 49.

SFWA, POLITICS, WHAT'S NEW?

The Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America <www.sfwa.org> and politics are no stranger lately. Two writers of at least some note have ratcheted up the confrontational tone—John C. Wright has quit <tinyurl.com/JCWvsSFWA> and Brad R. Torgersen has promised to let his membership lapse. Former SFWA President Michael Capobianco has fired back, with a reply on Wright's blog and others (e.g., <katsudon.net/?p=2995>) have also chimed in on the other side(s).

The underlying differences are, well, political and thus inherently complicated. The *Shuttle* declines to try to parse the arguments but you're encouraged to do the research if you have any interest.

GUFF BALLOT AVAILABLE ONLINE

Voting for the Get Up and Over (or Going Under) Fan Fund (Australasia to/from Europe) can now be done online http:// rantalica.com/guff/guff-voting-ballot>. This is a south-to-north year, so any of the four candidates will be visiting London for the Worldcon. At least some of them also want to go to Shamrokon <www.shamrokon.ie> (this year's Eurocon) and/or Finncon <2014.finncon.org> as well. A minimum donation of £5, €6, \$AU10, or \$NZ10 is required. Voting ends Monday 9 June 2014 at 23:59 GMT.

TAFF WINNER ANNOUNCED

Curt Phillips has been announced as the winner of the 2014 Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund (North American to/from Europe), The 3-way race was settled in the first round. There were 139 votes cast, 100 from North America; 39 from Europe (and 1 from the rest of the world). In the stats below, the RoW vote was rolled into the North American total (by the administrators) to preserve vote anonymity. Voting raised \$1187.68 plus £266.

This is a west-to-east year, so the winner will be headed to London for the Worldcon. Voting stats follow, including the "20% rule" (specifying the winner get 20% of the North American and European vote; considered separately).

Note that the numbers herein are directly from the official report, though they do not quite track mathematically. -ED]

The (to be) annual \$500 Diverse Writers Grant is to "support new and emerging writers from underrepresented and underprivileged groups, including writers of color, women, queer writers, disabled writers, working-class writers, and those whose marginalized identities may present additional obstacles in the writing and/or publishing process."

The (to be) annual \$500 Diverse Worlds Grant is "intended for work that best presents a diverse world, regardless of the writer's background." Winners for this first year of both grants "are expected to be announced by" 15 September 2014.

2014 Hugo Noms

Nominees for the 2014 Hugo Awards and John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer were announced Saturday 19 April 2014 by Loncon 3 www.loncon3.org, the 2014 Worldcon.

Members of last year's Worldcon (LoneStarCon 3, San Antonio) as well as next year's Worldcon (Sasquan, Spokane) were also eligible to vote in this nominating round. A total of

1923 valid nominating ballots were received. That count blew away the previous record of 1343 nominating ballots from last year. It even exceeds last year's final-round turnout of 1848 votes.

The 2014 Hugo Awards ceremony will be Sunday 17 August 2014. Only members of Loncon 3 can vote in the final round. By category the nominees are:

1939 Retro Hugo Noms

Nominees for the 1939 Retrospective Hugo Awards were announced Saturday 19 April 2014 by Loncon 3 <www.loncon3.org>, the 2014 Worldcon.

Retro Hugos are authorized by Section 3.13 of the World Science Fiction Society Constitution. In short, any Worldcon can choose to award Retrospective Hugos <u>if</u> there was a Worldcon held 50, 75, or 100 years earlier and <u>if</u> that earlier Worldcon did not award Hugos and <u>if</u> no prior Worldcon has exercised a valid option to award Retro Hugos for that year.

In most other respects, the Retro Hugo rules parallel the regular Hugo rules in effect at the time of the sponsoring Worldcon. In this case that meant (among other things) that members of last year's Worldcon (LoneStarCon 3, San Antonio) as well as next year's Worldcon (Sasquan, Spokane) could cast nominating votes. A total of 233 valid nominating ballots were received.

DeepSouthCon 52 Breaking News

Due in large part to DeepSouthCon <en.wikipedia.org/wiki/DeepSouthCon> 52 falling on the same weekend that this issue of the *Shuttle* must be put to bed, we don't have a full report. We're happy, though, that we can include some basics and

some breaking news (supplied by Judy Smith, Sam Smith, and Warren Buff in various emails and phone calls).

DSC 52—THE BASICS

The 52nd DeepSouthCon was held 16–18 May 2014 in conjunction with Contrails <www.contrails-sf.org>, a start-up convention held at the Holiday Inn & Convention Center in Bristol VA. Invited guests included GoH Gordon Van Gelder; Fan GoHs Naomi Fisher, Pat Molloy, and Grace Molloy; Artist GoH Charles Vess, and Musical GoH Marc Michael. The convention advertised itself as "an 'old fashioned' sci fi literature con with an emphasis on the written word, discussion and southern hospitality." Reported attendance was 61 (60 humans and 1 dog) as of early evening on Saturday of the con.

DEEPSOUTHCON AWARDS & CONTESTS

Another award, the Rubble, is also traditionally given at DSC. It's for the person (or occasionally organization/group) that's done the most *to* Southern Fandom. This year's **Rubble Award** went to **Gary Robe** (reportedly self-inflicted, for botching the Southern Fandom Press Alliance "Ego Boo" vote). Guy Lillian III noted that this is the third time that Gary, who founded the Rubble, has "won" his own creation.

In other semi-related news, **Bill Zielke** won the traditional **DSC Hearts Tournament** (becoming what is sometimes known as Hearts Champion of the Known Universe).

SFC BUSINESS

The Southern Fandom Confederation www.smithuel.net/sfc/frameset/home.htm is not directly associated with Deep-SouthCon, but does have their annual meeting there. Business is often slight, but that wasn't really true this year.

On the routine side, the existing slate of officers was reelected—President Jennifer Liang, Vice-President M. Lee (Mike) Rogers, Secretary Tom Feller, and Treasurer Patrick Molloy.

On the rather non-routine side, two changes were proposed to the SFC Bylaws < www.smithuel.net/sfchb/hberrata.html #SFCBylaws>. One amendment passed, to remove the word "Confederacy" from Section 1 where the list of states is given from which members of the organization are sought. It is not clear to the *Shuttle* how this affects the wording of Section 3 wherein residency of officers is limited. A second amendment failed (8–14), to add wording concerning non-discrimination against protected classes of persons. Reports to the *Shuttle* are sketchy, but it appears that the wording of this second amendment will be worked on and resubmitted to the SFC Business Meting next year.

DSC SITE SELECTION

DSC itself also holds a business meeting, at which often the only order of business is to select the site of the rotating convention two years in the future. Last year (at DSC 51, held in conjunction with JordanCon in Atlanta GA) the site of DSC 53 was chosen to be New Orleans LA—to be held in conjunction with Contraflow V <contraflowscifi.org>.

This year, there was only one bid. Ron Zukowski and M. Lee (Mike) Rogers put forward a bid for Atlanta as a standalone convention (that is, *not* to be held in conjunction with an annual con). The con, to be named ABC DSC, was selected by acclamation and will be held 14–16 May 2016. No guests were announced, but they do have a hotel agreement. At press time the *Shuttle* is unaware of the name of the hotel, but room rates are said to be in the \$90 range (presumably plus *beaucoup* taxes).
